


LINCOLN CROSSROADS MUSIC FESTIVAL



2022 Annual report

Better than the beforetimes

Lincoln Crossroads Music Festival returned with full vigor in 2022 and was held from July 23-31, 2022 in nine different venues throughout Lincoln, Nebraska in a celebration of travel and travelers. Over the course of nine days, the festival presented 12 concerts world-class concerts, two storytelling sessions, two jams sessions and two educational events for young people and children.

CONCERT HIGHLIGHTS



Kiev to New England

The opening concert took place on July 23 with the Kytasty Family Bandura Ensemble, performing both traditional Ukrainian songs and modern compositions on the bandura, which many consider to be the national instrument of Ukraine. After their very moving performance, proceeds of which were donated to support musicians in Ukraine, Julian Kytasty led off the first of two storytelling slams that were hosted by Nebraska actor and storyteller Rita Paskowitz

Celebration of Places

Gabriel Kahane

Singer-songwriter Gabriel Kahane performed many works from his latest two albums in both a solo show on Tuesday, July 26th and a collaborative performance with string quartet on Thursday, July 28th. His intensely lyrical and potent texts and complex chamber music writing captivated audiences at the Lied Center's Johnny Carson Theater and at an outdoor appearance at the Lincoln Community Foundation Gardens



Meditation Concert

Improvisations and short works from five of the festival artists were performed on July 26th as part of the festival's first meditation concert, which was introduced by a licensed mentalhealth counselor and provided a low-key and stigma-free concert environment

Golden Studio feat. Majed Chamseddine

Lincoln's own Golden Studio was joined by Lebanese Oud star Majed Chemseddine. Majed is based in Michigan and this was the first time the he had met the musicians of Golden Studio. Their performance included both moving vocal ballads as well as an extended dance set, where the audience partipated in a traditional circle dance



EDUCATION

SAIL Camp

The first of the festival's education events was a performance for over 300 students of SAIL (Strings Alliance in Lincoln) Camp, which is for young students of string instruments. The Kytasty Family Bandura Ensemble performed traditional and new Ukrainian music for the students with accompaniment from Erik Higgins and Olga Smola.



Baby concert

Another educational program is the festival's annual baby concert for young children and their families. The kids were guided by the story of the little boy with his red balloon, who travels the world to meet musicians from all over the globe. Around 40 children and their families participated

STORY SLAMS

Rita Paskowitz led two different storytelling slams during the festival. The first was a storytelling competition where the judges (pictured) gave scores to the eight stories told by audience members. In the second slam audience members were paired together to create stories to try and fool the audience



JAM SESSIONS

The jam sessions of the Lincoln Crossroads Music Festival radiates the true spirit of the festival –where festival artists and community members to play, talk and sing together. There were two jam sessions during the 2022 festival

Audiences

Children and young people

Through our outreach concert at SAIL Camp, baby concert and jam session for kids, we reached over 350 children and young people, leveraging the high level of artistry that the festival brings to Lincoln to provide musical exposure and inspiration to all ages.

Community of Artists

Serving the needs of Nebraska's musicians, artists and storytellers, especially those whose who have until now mostly unheard and unseen, is equally important as building and serving our audiences. It is also here where the festival has clearly succeeded from the very first season. Many of the artists (both local and visiting) feel that the Crossroads festival is their musical "home" where they feel most appreciated and welcome musically. It is a community that we're constantly striving to expand through outreach and programming


