


Lincoln Crossroads Music Festival 2021





The performance, entitled 'The Peacock at the Crossroads' with Sandeep, Suhail and Samina features an exciting new collaboration with Grammy-winning Tabla maestro and composer Sandeep Das, Sarangi artist Suhail Yusuf Khan and visual artist Samina Hooda.

While in Lincoln, they aspire to engage with members of Lincoln's Yezidi community in a heartfelt gesture of learning about their heritage and collaborating with them to create a musical and artistic expression, which will be presented at the event as a homage to the community. The title of the concert is inspired by Melek Taus, the Yezidi peacock angel.

Additionally, the audience will also enjoy a projection of Samina's artwork in an animated format where her paintings will dance and pulsate to the music of Sandeep Das to express a narrative of a people compelled to leave their motherlands to find pathways to hope and opportunities.





Aisslinn Nosky



Aisslinn Nosky was appointed Concertmaster of the Handel and Haydn Society in 2011 and Principal Guest Conductor of the Niagara Symphony Orchestra in 2016. With a reputation for being one of the most dynamic and versatile violinists of her generation, Nosky is in great demand internationally as a soloist, conductor/director and concertmaster.

Aisslinn is a member of I FURIOSI Baroque Ensemble an innovative Canadian ensemble, which for two decades has presented its own edgy and inventive concert series in Toronto, Europe and North America turning new audiences on to Baroque music. With the Eybler Quartet, Nosky explores repertoire from the first century of the string quartet literature on period instruments.

Ms. Nosky's latest recording of Mozart's Concerto in G major with the Handel and Haydn Society was released in 2018 on the CORO label.

Anna Steinhoff



Described by critics as "soulful," and "the rhythmic heart of the ensemble." In Chicago, Anna specializes in the baroque cello and viola da gamba. She is a member of Third Coast Baroque, the Haymarket Opera Company, and Second City Musick, and was recently appointed to be principal cellist with the Indianapolis Baroque Orchestra.

Anna is a founding member of Wayward Sisters, with whom she won first prize in the 2011 Early Music America competition. Wayward Sisters released their debut album of music by Matthew Locke on the Naxos label and their second recording, a Restless Heart, was released in 2017. In addition to classical music, Anna has performed and recorded with indie rock bands Saturday Looks Good To Me, Mysteries of Life, Frisbie, and children's artist Justin Roberts. Anna received degrees in cello performance from the Oberlin Conservatory and Northwestern University where her principal teachers were Peter Rejto and Hans Jensen. She studied baroque cello in the Netherlands with Jaap ter Linden.

April Sun



Boston-based pianist April Sun enjoys a multi-faceted musical life as a performer, educator, and arts organizer, who values curiosity, sincerity, and fun in her work/play. As an avid collaborator, she frequently performs with small ensembles such as the Meadowlark Piano Trio, Phoenix and the Cape Cod Chamber Orchestra.

As a cultural organizer, she co-directs Music for Food, a nonprofit that uses music to generate funds for food pantries. She holds a Doctorate of Musical Arts in collaborative piano from the Cleveland Institute of Music, She completed her B.A. in music, with minors in English and Art History, at the University of Nebraska–Lincoln. Her many wonderful mentors have included Daniel Shapiro, Anita Pontremoli, Paul Barnes, Kim Kashkashian, Peter Salaff, Hyeyung Yoon, Francesca Brittan, and Susan McClary.

Brian Seifferlein



Brian Seifferlein has been working in video and media for over 20 years. He has worked making documentaries and media about Nebraska and the world. In 2019, Brian produced a podcast for Nebraska Public Media that was largely centered around the same themes of The Lincoln Crossroads Music Festival. "The Sound of Home," is a podcast for Nebraska Public Media's series, "The Plainstory Podcast," and is hosted

by Genevieve Randall. It follows her while she explores the music of Lincoln and the diversity of the place she lives. In 2020, Brian began working for Lincoln Public Schools where his mission is to tell the many stories of the schools' students, teachers and families. "We Will Not Be Silent," is the first documentary produced by and for LPS and serves as an example of the types of work Brian hopes to bring to the district. Brian has also produced the Lincoln Crossroads Music Festival's own interview series "Crossroads Conversations" that follows 12 Crossroads artists during the 2020 pandemic.

Coro di Flauti



Coro di Flauti is a Lincoln-based flute choir with 24 members under the direction of Dick Marolf. Since the group's founding in 2013, they have performed a wide variety of repertoire in and around Lincoln. The group is also a driving force

behind a biennial Lincoln project, "Flute Salad" where many flutists from around the region converge for concerts and events.


Edem Soul Music



Edem Soul Music originally Edem K. Garro was both born and raised on the east coast and raised in the Midwest. Edem sings in her native tongue, called 'Ga' originating from the Ga Tribe of Ghana, West Africa. Growing up her parents made sure that she always remembered to understand where she came from! They not only taught her the language but the culture as well. One thing Edem's mother taught her, was

that under no circumstance... Was she ever to forget who she was, or where she came from. After completing her 2017 UCA residency and winning the 2018 Omaha Entertainment Arts Award for Best Soul, Edem Soul Music continues to shape her sound with the very instruments she was raised by. Edem Soul Music's sound ranges from Classical to Hip-Hop. Soul to Folk. SingerSongwriter to Electronic; all while utilizing stringed instruments like the Ukulele and the Harp, percussive instruments like the Djembe and many more.

Erik Higgins



Lincoln Crossroads Music Festival Artistic and Executive Director Erik Higgins grew up in Lincoln, Nebraska where he started playing double bass in the Lincoln Public Schools strings program. At the age of 14 he joined Lincoln's Symphony Orchestra, where he played for four seasons before moving away to attend Indiana University School of Music. Higgins studied at the Academy of the

Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestra in Munich, Germany, and has held positions in the Hamburg State Opera, A Far Cry Chamber Orchestra in Boston, and the Aarhus Symphony Orchestra in Aarhus Denmark, his current position. An avid early music specialist as well, he has been a regularly performing member with the Handel and Haydn Society in Boston, Concerto Copenhagen in Denmark, and many other period ensembles in addition to other pop, folk and world music projects.

Golden Studio



The Golden Studio is a Lincoln-based band made up of Yazidi musicians led by Hasan Khalil. The Golden Studio are fluent in many styles, including Arabic, Turkish, Kurdish, Persian and traditional Syrian music. They are a constant feature at Yazidi weddings and other social events in Lincoln and have an active YouTube and Facebook presence.

High Street Irish



High Street Irish performs traditional Irish tunes that you might hear in an Irish pub. Featuring Marcia Claesson (autoharp, mountain dulcimer, melodica), Candy Popek (hammered dulcimer), Ashley Heckman (Irish stepdance), Chris Hodges (mandolin), Ethan Jensen (bouzouki), and Kurt Oates (penny whistle, mountain dulcimer).

Jarana



Jarana is a proudly local Lincoln band led by Daniel Martinez that fuses sounds of the Andes with acoustic flamenco riffs, rock beats and the salsa flavor of montunos and timbales. Pronounced JaRaNa (HAH-RAH-nah), it is a noun and verb meaning an event when all ages come together socially in a public place to enjoy and celebrate with food, games, music

and dancing. Jarana is a band built on energetic, danceable music blending South American, African and Mediterranean beats. Shows include Flamenco, Rumba and Salsa styles with complex rhythms and infectious beats and exotic melodies. A variety of Andean and South American folk ballads are sung with conviction accompanied on authentic, traditional instruments. The occasional familiar cover gets a Latin makeover that infuses it with new life making it uniquely Jarana.

Jessica Dussault



Jessica Dussault is a cellist from Lincoln, NE. She began her studies with Tracy Sands, during which time Jessica was a Nebraska All-State principal chair, Nebraska Young Artist Award winner, and Senior Soloist with the Lincoln Youth Symphony. Jessica studied with Karen Becker at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) was awarded a BA in Music and History. Jessica performs with many regional groups including

the Nebraska Chamber Players, Abendmusik, and Lincoln's Symphony Orchestra.

Less Talk More Polka



Less Talk More Polka is an acoustic polka band based out of Lincoln Nebraska. We play traditional Czech and German polkas along with newer adaptations of classic tunes.

Maeve Gilchrist



Described by one critic as "a phenomenal harp player who can make her instrument ring with unparalleled purity", Maeve Gilchrist has taken the Celtic harp to new levels of performance. Born and raised in Edinburgh, Scotland, and currently based in Brooklyn, New York, Maeve's innovative approach to her instrument stretches its harmonic limits and improvisational possibilities. She

is as at home as a soloist with an internationally renowned orchestra as she is playing with a traditional Irish folk group or using electronic augmentation in a more contemporary, improvisatory setting. She tours internationally as a band leader as well as maintaining a number of collaborations including a duo project with percussive dancer Nic Gareiss, a more electronics-based project with Viktor Krauss and as a member of the Irish network commissioned 'Edges of Light' quartet: a multidisciplinary group featuring the piper David Power, dancer Colin Dunne and the fiddler Tola Custy. She has appeared at such major music events as Celtic Connections in Glasgow, Tanglewood Jazz festival, the World Harp Congress in Amsterdam and the opening of the Scottish Parliament. She has played with such luminaries as Esperanza Spalding, Tony Trishka, Ambrose Akinmusire, Solas and Darol Anger. Maeve has released five albums to date, including her most recent recording Vignette, on Adventure Records, with Nashville legend Viktor Krauss while on her own label hersolo Ostinato Project is a beguiling exploration of the possibilities of her instrument.

Nimo Patel



Nimesh Patel aka Nimo, was born and brought up in Los Angeles, California, and then went on to live in Philadelphia, New York City and Pune, before settling where he is now, in Ahmedabad, India. After passing through various phases in his life (Academic, Corporate, Artistic, Social, Entrepreneurial, Service), he has finally began

to understand what it means to align our head, hands and heart. Through his music and desire to serve the world in small ways, Nimo has embarked on an inspiring and fulfilling journey inwards. He currently resides in the Gandhi Ashram, Ahmedabad, India, where Mahatma Gandhi spent 13 years of his life spreading the messages of truth, love and non-vio-lence.

Olga Smola



A versatile violinist, Olga Smola plays solo and ensemble performances in many different styles of music including classical, jazz, rock, country and electronic music as a violin DJ.

Olga Smola was born in Krasnoyarsk, Russia and took her first violin lessons at the age of six. She graduated with honors from the Moscow State Conservatory in 2004, and finished her PhD at the

Moscow Conservatory in 2012.

Since then, music has taken Smola around the world. Her solo touring credits include concerts in Monaco, Spain, Belgium, Croatia, France, England, Azerbaijan, the United States, and throughout the Russian Federation.

Since August 2016, Smola has served as a professor of music at the University of Nebraska at Omaha where she also serves as the music director, Russian culture consultant, composer and violinist for the Ollie Webb's Center.

Oscar Rios Pohirieth



Oscar Rios Pohirieth is a professional musician and has performed throughout Mexico, the United States and Europe. With over 30 years of experience, he specializes in the music of the Andes. Pohirieth is also a traveling and teaching artist through the Nebraska Arts and Humanities Council.

Pohirieth helps students learn unique instruments that they have often never seen or heard before. He analyzes the history, development and playing techniques of various Native Andean instruments such as the Zampoñas (Andean Pan Pipes), the Quena (a recorder-like flute) and the Bombo (drum from African influence) to name a few. Through this process, Pohirieth hopes to create curiosity, cooperation and collaboration for exploring new music and culture.

Peter Ferguson



Peter Ferguson is a natural engagement specialist and a community stakeholder. Ferguson's real-world education is backed by 25 years of professional leadership experience, including coordination of adult and youth leadership development, inclusion, diversity, equity work, athletic enrichment, relationship building, and individual, group and personal growth. His personal and professional purpose aligns with his values to empower and educate

while building on the investment and contributions of those who have taken steps before him toward equity, justice, kindness, and civility.

Rita Paskowitz



In her search for identity, Rita Paskowitz has been an actress, writer, improvisationalist, and stand-up comedian, working from New York City to Los Angeles. At long last, she found herself as a storyteller simply trying to live up to her hair.

Rita has entertained and edified the state for the Nebraska Arts Council and

Arts Are Basic/Aesthetic Education for Children, while also teaching STORYTELLING AND EDUCATION at the University of Nebraska/Omaha and HOLOCAUST TO HOMELAND at Temple Israel.

Rita is Co-founder and Director of Creative Healing (a program for bereavement specialists) and is the Storytell-er-in-Residence at Ted E. Bear Hollow, a center for grieving children and teens. She is on the staff of UNO's Certified Public Managers Institute and UNMC's Great Plains Public Health Leadership Institute.

Samina Hooda



Samina Hooda is a visual artist, a community leader and an entrepreneur from Dallas, Texas. Her art is inspired by her enlightened encounters with life itself- by the beauty within people, magnificence of nature, richness of cultures, and by our history as it unfolds around us.

Samina's undergraduates in Architecture deepened her appreciation of art and architecture as expressions of humanity's values and imagination. She enjoys pencil sketching and creating vibrant acrylic paintings to bring joy and meaning to the viewers.

Her painting titled Light upon Light was a finalist at the juried National Jubilee Arts Festival organized by the Aga Khan Council for USA in Los Angeles, CA.

At the Lincoln Crossroads Music Festival, Samina will be showcasing her paintings in a unique animated format titled The Peacock at the Crossroads. The audience will see her paintings dance and pulsate to express a narrative of a people who leave their motherlands to find pathways to hope & renewal. 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
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
